

Reports by the participants of the 4th EAIS Publication Workshop

When I concluded my PhD journey some months ago, I realized that I had lots and lots of materials I did not include in my dissertation which could be packaged into shorter articles. However, my publishing experience was very limited, and I did not feel confident enough in my writing to start sending articles to journals. In addition, my PhD project was highly interdisciplinary, and I struggled to get a grasp on how to strike a balance between Japanese studies related content and discipline-specific methodologies and theories to develop texts that could speak to scholars and researchers in the field of Japanese studies. The 4th EAJS Publication Workshop came exactly at the right time.

It was exciting to get the chance to spend two days with so many promising young scholars working on different topics and developing new approaches to answer compelling questions. Reading a variety of papers and listening to the senior advisors' comments provided insights on the publication process as well as on common mistakes and how to avoid them. The relaxed atmosphere and positive approach to asking questions and providing feedback created a safe space in which everyone felt comfortable enough to express their reflections and it made the emergence of creative suggestions possible. The roundtable with journal editors made for an open and sincere conversation which touched on topics we are often too shy to discuss openly in other academic settings.

I am extremely grateful to have been a part of this workshop as it motivated me to work on my manuscript with renewed enthusiasm and provided me with the confidence necessary to present my work to journals. I would like to express my gratitude to the organizers at Freie Universitaet Berlin for their warm welcome and kind guidance throughout the workshop; thank you also to the Japan Foundation for their support of this initiative which is essential for young scholars and researchers. It was a productive and encouraging workshop, and I sincerely hope that many more PhD students will have the chance to experience such a well-organized, heartwarming, kind, and academically motivating event in the future!

Being invited to the EAJS Publication Workshop has been a privilege and a challenge, given the relatively short amount of time for producing an article manuscript. Receiving feedback for my

humble manuscript from experienced academics was a great opportunity to see my own work in a new light and get ideas for expanding and improving on it. Being able to read and hear the feedback for other manuscripts was also useful, giving a glimpse into how one might go about producing and giving peer review.

The schedule of the workshop was especially well thought-out, giving plenty of breaks and ample opportunity to further discuss our manuscripts with professors and peers in a more relaxed manner. The shared dinners were also a simple but much appreciated addition to the formal event, allowing for a cordial exchange of ideas. My personal highlight was the opportunity to hear from the editors of prominent journals. The general introductions and practical advice were invaluable to someone who is just starting out on their academic career.

My only slight point of criticism is that throughout the workshop we neglected to discuss the current broader issues with academic publishing in general. In light of the current lawsuit filed against six major academic publishers in the US, the workshop might have been enriched by a discussion on how the academic publishing ecosystem could be improved upon in the future, to help emerging scholars avoid having to simply integrate into a flawed system.

As a doctoral candidate approaching the end of my program, I have been feeling anxious about my future career as a scholar in an increasingly competitive academic environment. The workshop has successfully unveiled the process of academic publishing, making it less daunting and less intimidating.
